HBO: Documentaries

Sebastian Junger Shoots for Truth

Junger's powerful new documentary about the life of war photographer Tim Hetherington shows us why dedicated journalists are needed now more than ever.



Which Way Is the Front Line from Here premiered at Sundance in January and airs on HBO on April 18th. It was directed by writer Sebastian Junger, who became a close friend of Hetherington's when the two

worked together in Afghanistan in 2007 and 2008. The documentary is 80 minutes and takes measure of the photographer's extraordinary life and work, weaving Hetherington's own footage from Liberia to Afghanistan together with heartbroken friends and family.

NIK Software Update

When Google recently announced that it was pulling support for the desktop version of Nik's Snapseed editing software, people started to worry what this meant for the rest of Nik's non-mobile products. But a new announcement from Google has the company not only recommitting to these plugins, but also dramatically dropping the price.

Today the company announced the Nik Collection by Google, which is every single one of Nik's desktop plugins in a single bundle, for just \$149. This marks the end of them being sold as separates, and for that flat fee, you get Dfine® 2.0, Viveza® 2, HDR Efex ProTM 2, Color Efex ProTM 4 Complete Edition, Silver Efex ProTM 2, and Sharpener ProTM 3.0.

Previously, individual plugins would run around the \$100 mark, with a bundle of all of them costing as much as \$500. The new, \$149 bundle will not just feature all six plugins, but will work on all supported applications from a single installer: Photoshop, Photoshop Elements, Lightroom, and Apple Aperture.

If you previously bought any of these plugins, Google isn't going to leave you in the cold for already having dropped a lot of money. If you purchased any individual plugin within the last five years, you get the entire collection for free. If you spent more than \$149 on plugins since February 22nd of this year, you'll be refunded the difference.

The Nik bundle of plugins normally costs – \$499.95 – but right now the package is only – \$149 – and if you use coupon code **hdrsoftware15** that will give you an extra \$22.35 off. That's on top of an already great deal for a grand total discount of \sim 75% off (\$499.95 minus \$373.30) to bring the collection package price down to \$126.65

(Ed Note: I could not find where one is eligible for an upgrade if plugin was purchased in last five years. Only date found on-line for free upgrade is since June 12, 2012.)



Back Story

The back story, here, is that we were visiting a rural Myanmar school, class was in session and I was in the corridor taking pictures of the class members through the window of the door. The window glass had been removed which made the it easier for me to "shoot".

While "shooting", I felt the presence of someone next to me and looking down, I saw this novice monk. I moved quickly to a nearby door which opened into the classroom. This gave me an opportunity to take this shot of the novice monk who was still standing where I left him, looking through the window of the other side of the door.

There seemed to be a longing in his look that indicated to me that he would have liked to be one of the boys he was watching in the class-room

During a trip, last year, to The Great Smoky Mountains, we visited the area called Cades Cove. If you are familiar with Cades Cove you are aware of the eleven mile one way loop which offers some of the best op-



portunities for wildlife viewing in the park. Large numbers of white-tailed deer are frequently seen, and sightings of black bear, coyote, ground hog, turkey, raccoon, skunk, and other animals are common. It was during our trip on the "loop" that we spotted a herd of White-tailed Buck Deer in Summer Velvet. Most of them left the field where they were grazing before I could get in position to "shoot". This White-tailed Buck remained and spent

a few minutes almost "posing" before trotting way to join the Bachelor Herd.

Antler growth, development, loss of velvet and antler shedding are all dependent upon hormone levels and minerals in the diet. The hormone that impacts the annual antler cycle is testosterone. Typically, as testosterone levels increase bucks will rub off their velvet. When testosterone levels decrease, usually in late winter, their antlers fall off.

Photo Essay

- 1. This is mostly the original photo from a foggy day in England. What other weather would there be? I made an additional copy (layer 2) of the original just in case I messed up. On a third layer I used a mask in order to erase a tree near the oak. Lastly I lightened the whole thing with a curves adjustment layer. So at the moment I have 4 layers.
- 2. On the next layer above the curves layer I added a texture (layer 5) from cg textures (http://www.cgtextures.com). They have millions of textures, mostly for free. You just have to pick and choose. I sized the texture to fit, then ran through the blend modes until I found one that suited me. This is a multiply mode at 80%. At this point I could use a mask and erase textured areas wherever I didn't want it. In this case I left it alone. For layer 6 I added the Chinese symbol in overlay blend mode at 67% just to balance out the trees in the far left background and because I liked it. The symbol was made in black and white and then all but the black ink erased by adjusting the levels. Layer 7 I used the black and white adjustment layer moving the little level things around to fit how I wanted the image to look.3. Above the bw adjustment layer I added a new layer, layer 8, and filled it with black. Then I used the screen blend mode. With a rough round bristle brush, or one of your choosing, I began to paint away, changing the brush size randomly, until I was happy with it. It is easy at this point to erase and try again switching the brush between black and white. You could also create additional layers like 8 and try different brushes for painting and then choose a layer that you like.
- 4. The last stage is to add a new bw adjustment layer and tint it. I use about a R225 G211 B175 tint. This final stage is saved with all its layers. I then flattened the image and saved it as "titleflat" so I don't lose the layered file.
